
FIRST CONDITIONAL



WHAT IS FIRST CONDITIONAL?

First conditional is a structure used to talk about possibilities in the future.

WHAT'S ITS STRUCTURE?


- A first conditional sentence is made of two clauses: an 'if' clause and a main clause.
- The 'if' clause uses the present simple tense; the main clause, will + base form.
- The order of the clauses doesn't change the meaning of the sentence
- When the 'if' clause goes first, you use a comma between the clauses. When the main clause goes first, there's no need of a comma.

EXAMPLES

	ʻif clause	main clause
	If you study hard,	you will pass the test
	If she goes out,	her mom won't be happy
	main clause	ʻif clause
	You will pass the test	if you study hard
]	Her mom won't be happy	if she goes out

MORE EXAMPLES...

Have you ever heard of Murphy's laws? They are a perfect example of using first conditionals
